
Proclamation "Abbott Sisters Day" March 20, 2017



WHEREAS. Edith Abbot was the first female dean of a major American

university graduate school, at the University of Chicago's

School of Social Service Administration: and

Grace Abbott was, as chief of the United States Children's WHEREAS,

> Bureau, the most powerful woman in the federal government at the time when the Great Depression hit, and her work provided

the first major effort to combat the economic crisis; and

WHEREAS, Edith Abbott helped to establish the first graduate program of

> social work in a major university, and has been recognized as "the chief architect of America's social work educational

system"; and

Grace Abbott is known as "the great American champion of WHEREAS.

> children's rights" and is recognized as having led the early twentieth century fights to end child labor and to establish child

health care; and

WHEREAS. Grace and Edith Abbott were born and bred in the city of Grand

> Island in the state of Nebraska and were the children of O.A. Abbott, who was the state of Nebraska's first Lt. Governor, and of Elizabeth Abbott, who was a leader in the early days of the women's suffrage movement in Nebraska and in the formation

of the Grand Island Public Library; and

WHEREAS. Grace and Edith Abbott, to the ends of their lives, wished to be

know as "the Abbott Sisters of Nebraska"; and

WHEREAS. "The Abbott Sisters of Nebraska" are great American women

> who - despite their important achievements for the rights of children, immigrants, and women - remain virtually unknown to

many Nebraskans; and
