


With deteriorating water quality issues facing communities in the North Platte River Basin in southeast Wyoming and western Nebraska, the potential for regional water systems have been discussed and considered in the Valley long before this specific project. The ever-increasing regulatory efforts of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), particularly through the National Safe Water Drinking Act, and the effects those have on our fiscal ability to produce quality potable water for our constituents only enhances the benefit of a regional approach to potable water.

# PAWS, specifically:

- 1. May, 2010 Goshen County and the City of Torrington submitted a Statement of Interest to the Bureau of Reclamation (BUREC)
- 2. June, 2010 BUREC invited Submittal of Proposal
- 3. July, 2010 Goshen County, City of Torrington, Scotts Bluff County, & City of Scottsbluff Submitted Proposal to BUREC
- 4. August, 2010 BUREC Awarded Grant (grants < \$200,000 were funded 100%)
- 5. December, 2010 BUREC Appraisal Investigation Agreement executed with Goshen County as the Agreement Sponsor, Ready to Begin
- Administration of Appraisal Investigation (kick-off meeting was February, 2011): a. Advisory Board – met two times in person
  b. Project Team – met weekly by conference call until completed
- 7. Appraisal Investigation was completed November, 2011
- 8. December, 2014 After multiple reviews by BUREC the final report was submitted and the Bureau issued their report (BUREC report received in February, 2015).
- 9. August, 2015 Goshen County submitted application to WWDC for Level II Study to finalize recommended alternate and complete preliminary design
- 10. December, 2015 WWDC & Legislature Select Water Committee approved Level II Study
- 11. August, 2016 Agreements approved between parties (Scottsbluff, NE agreed to pay 50% of study costs), and work began
- 12. Next:
  - a. Further evaluation of water supply and alternatives
  - b. Formation of Governance for the Regional Water System
  - c. September, 2018 Scheduled completion date for Level II Study
